Community Innovation Fund Round 1 report to the Social Value group

1. Background

Following approval for the proposed grants process from the Social Value Group on the 13th May round 1 for the Dorset Community Innovation Fund opened for applications on 2nd August, closed on 12th September and the applicant panel was held on 6th October.

The fund was advertised widely; on Grantfinder, through the DCC community networks, DCC Member networks and on social media.

2. Application Portfolio

The portfolio contained 31 applications with total project costs of £559,144

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The quality of applications in Round 1 was high with 61% of the applications progressing to the stage 2 assessment.

42% of those that passed stage 2 were invited to Assessment Panel and 1 application seeking just £1,000 that scored highly being offered a quick grant.

In total 7 applications were funded, giving an overall success rate of 23% which compares favourably to most grant programmes.

Common reasons for being declined at stage 1 assessment are:

- Applicant organisation not in eligible area
- Project did not significantly differentiate to organisations core business.
- Organisation was a private organisation with no community interest stated in Memorandums of Articles document.

A detailed list of the 31 applications is appended to this report.

3. Safe, Healthy, Independent & Prosperous Objectives

As part of the application organisations had to demonstrate which outcomes their project would help to deliver and how these outcomes would be measured. Most organisations understood this and identified where their projects would contribute towards this, though some did identify some of their own outcomes. I have made recommendations to make this clearer in round 2. Some applications also tried to meet too many of these outcomes for the scope of their projects.

Lessons Learnt – Application & Assessment Process:

Overall the new application and assessment process worked and round 2 only needs a few tweaks. Feedback received from the panel and the applicants who attended the panel felt it was well organised and were able to 'bring the projects to life', particularly those who chose to bring along service users.

One critic of the application process for round 1 was the time of year it was open for applications – being open for 6 weeks during August and September, several organisations have chosen to defer their applications to the second round due to summer staffing resource restrictions during the application period. I have helped to balance this by allowing a significant underspend in round 1.

4. **Underspend** We have an underspend of £20,276 which will be awarded in Round 2 as from conversations with organisations throughout the application process, I envisage a greater application response for Round 2 so the fund will be able to benefit a wider portfolio.

5. Request for the Social Value Group

I would like to seek authorisation for the Grant fund to be altered for Round 2 to accommodate the below modifications to the application criteria and assessment process:
