Subject of Report	Quarterly Reporting Against the Police and Crime Plan
Executive Summary	The panel is required to review or scrutinise decisions made, or other actions taken, by the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) in connection with the discharge of his functions.
	One important dimension of this is the panel's scrutiny of the Commissioner's delivery of his Police and Crime Plan.
	Members considered a draft Police and Crime Plan at their meeting on 7 February 2013. The plan was refined following comments from the Panel and public consultation and a final version launched on 28 March 2013. A copy of the final Plan was presented at the Police and Crime Panel meeting on 3 June 2013.
	At that meeting, members considered the format by which the PCC would report to them on progress against his plan. The intention of the quarterly monitoring report is to provide members with sufficient information to allow them to fulfil their scrutiny role and assess the Commissioner's progress in delivering against his priorities.
	The agreed reporting format provides information on performance and action taken within priority areas. Financial information is also supplied in relation to planned spend.
	In accordance with the decisions made at previous panel meetings, a separate 'spotlight' item has been added to the agenda to allow

panel members to undertake more in depth scrutiny in relation to the priority 'to reduce the number of people seriously harmed in Dorset'.

The 'spotlight' topic will be a regular item and members need to determine which priority areas they wish to explore in detail at future meetings. For reference, the priorities set out in the Police and Crime Plan are:

- Reduce the number of victims of crime and anti-social behaviour
- Reduce the number of people seriously harmed in Dorset
- Help protect the public from serious threats (local, regional and national) to their safety including organised crime and terrorism
- Reduce re-offending
- Increase people's satisfaction with policing in Dorset
- Support neighbourhood policing that is appropriate for both rural and urban communities in Dorset

Considering the PCC's progress against his Police and Crime Plan gives members the opportunity to explore areas of success and those that require further development.

In line with the panel's responsibility to be supportive, the Commissioners performance can be enhanced with the help of members' insight, understanding and constructive challenge.
