Subject of Report	Proposed Waiting Restrictions, Duck Lane, Stalbridge
Executive Summary	Following the advertising of proposed changes to parking restrictions in various roads in Stalbridge, objections have been received to the proposals for Duck Lane. This report considers those objections, and whether the proposals in Duck Lane should be implemented as advertised.

Recommendation	That having considered the objections received, Cabinet be recommended to approve the proposed waiting restrictions on Duck Lane, Stalbridge as originally advertised.
Reason for Recommendation	The proposals should improve the movement of vehicles along Duck Lane and give priority for parking to residents and visitors, and to parents dropping off and picking up at the Primary School, rather than all-day parking by employees in the town centre.

1. Background

- 1.1 Proposals were advertised for public consultation on 21 November 2014 for a variety of changes to waiting restrictions in Stalbridge. The only objections received were to the proposed No Waiting restrictions in Duck Lane, Stalbridge. This report considers those objections.
- 1.2 Duck Lane is a short cul-de-sac located on the northern side of Stalbridge town centre as shown in Appendix 1. The road is very narrow for most of its length but at the eastern end it has been widened to create a turning circle. At its western end there are older properties including a cycle shop, in the centre section there are accesses to the Stalbridge Primary School and to a large residential home, and at the eastern end there are 4 modern detached houses around the turning circle.
- 1.3 There have been parking problems in Duck Lane for many years and residents of the modern properties at the eastern end of the road have requested waiting restrictions. They were particularly concerned that emergency, refuse and delivery vehicles were sometimes unable to pass along the road due to parked vehicles. The residents requesting the restrictions all have off-street parking adjoining their properties.

2. Information

- 2.1 There are several competing demands for the parking spaces available in Duck Lane. The spaces are used by residents in the vicinity of the western end of Duck Lane who do not have off-street parking including residents on High Street and Church Hill. The spaces are also used for all-day parking by workers in both the town centre and at the adjoining residential home, and by parents and visitors to the Primary School.
- 2.2 County Council officers proposed that No Waiting Monday to Friday 10am to 2pm would be an appropriate restriction on the length of Duck Lane as shown in Appendix 2. This restriction would discourage all-day parking in Duck Lane by workers and give priority to parking by those residents who do not have off-street parking. It would also allow parents to park at school starting and finishing times. To allow for residents who need to park all-day, a length of unrestricted parking would remain on the southern side of Duck Lane at its western end.
- 2.3 The proposed restriction would improve access during Monday to Friday 10am to 2pm. The road would still be very congested at school starting and finishing times, and access would be difficult for large vehicles at those times. The proposed restriction would reduce the number of spaces available for those residents who leave their vehicles parked in Duck Lane during the working day, but it would result in more space being available for residents who return to Duck Lane after 2pm and park overnight and at weekends.

3. Law

Sections 1 and 2 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 allow the County Council to make an Order prohibiting or restricting the waiting of vehicles or the unloading of vehicles. The circumstances where an Order may be made include:

For avoiding danger to persons or other traffic using the road; For facilitating the passage on the road of any class of traffic;

4. Consultation

- 4.1 Under Dorset County Council's procedure, primary consultation was carried out on the proposed scheme and is supported by the Local Member, North Dorset District Council, Stalbridge Town Council and the Police.
- 4.2 There have been 10 responses to the public consultation process, and these are summarised below. There are 3 objections to the proposals from residents who regularly park in Duck Lane, 4 objections for other reasons, and 3 responses from residents strongly supporting the proposals:-



- 4.3 The 3 residents who object and regularly park in Duck Lane all live in Church Hill and High Street close to their junction with Duck Lane. Duck Lane is the nearest onstreet parking to their properties and they all mention having more than one vehicle. They all consider that there are times when they need to park in Duck Lane during the working day, and that the proposed restrictions would be detrimental to them.
- 4.4 Of the other 4 objections, one objector lives in Gillingham and parks in Duck Lane while working. Two of the objections relate to the narrowest point in Duck Lane near its western end and suggest that a No Waiting At Any Time restriction is required over a short length. One objector lives in Woodmill Close which is linked by footpath to the eastern end of Duck Lane, and he considers that the proposals will result in all-day parking migrating from Duck Lane into Woodmill Close.
- 4.5 The 3 responses strongly supporting the proposals are from residents of the modern properties at the eastern end of Duck Lane. These residents all have off-street parking within their properties, and they have all commented that they would prefer the restrictions to apply for a longer period such as 9.30am to 3pm.
- 4.6 Having considered all the responses received, it is considered that the current proposals are a reasonable compromise between the differing views of residents in the Duck Lane area. The proposals will only partly remove the problems of access into Duck Lane, but on balance it is considered that the introduction of the proposed restrictions should be progressed rather than leave the situation as existing.
