1. Question from Jenny Murray

With reference to new guidance issued by the Government dated 18th December 2023 regarding how public authorities should be complying with their duties under the Equality Act 2010

it clearly states:- "They (Authorities) should not use concepts such as gender or gender identity, which are not encoded in the act and can be understood in different ways." This is again repeated under "Myth 8".

So why has Dorset Council's EDI strategy document included 'Gender identity' as a protected characteristic and also made the undemocratic and startling announcement that all Dorset residents have a "gender identity" (see point 5.1) when they do not.

'Gender Identity' is a disputed, nebulous notion and has no definition in law. (The ONS wording included is also meaningless as there is no accompanying definition of "gender" in the document). Dorset Council must be aware of the risks it places on itself by going above the law at the request of Stonewall and/or other lobby groups – this is very well documented now - indeed the ONS is one of those very examples and has now withdrawn from Stonewall's WEI scheme.
