Higher Farmhouse is a Victorian farmhouse with outbuildings and gardens of around two acres, and in a secluded setting on the southern extremity of Langton Herring. It is largely surrounded on all four sides by hedging and or trees. Since 2012, the gardens have been used to stage Chesil Rocks, an annual not-for-profit music event that raises funds for the Dorset branch of Samaritans based in Weymouth.

This event will take place over three consecutive days in June of each year, between Thursday and Sunday and feature comedy, art, classical music and contemporary music.

The comedy and classical music/opera performances are amplified and take place in a marquee erected for the event, and the Saturday performances are also amplified and alternate between the marquee and an outside stage erected for the event. Loudspeakers face away from the village and all performances will finish by 2300 hrs.

There is an outside beer tent erected for the event and a cocktail/Prosecco bar, which is a permanent feature. Alcohol sales at the event will be restricted for consumption on the premises and the four licensing objectives of prevention of crime and disorder, public safety, the prevention of public nuisance and the protection of children from harm will be respected and followed.

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Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 10)

The four licensing objectives of preventing crime and disorder, ensuring public safety, preventing public nuisance and protecting children from harm will be respected and followed. It is understood and recognised that promoting the licensing objectives is clearly in the interests of the wider community.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

Chesil Rocks is widely advertised and run as a family friendly event and one that raises funds for Samaritans - it attracts families and a certain demographic. All bar staff have previous experience in serving alcohol, are aware of their responsibilities and receive refresher training before each event. It is incumbent upon bar staff and organisers to ensure there are no breaches of licensing conditions, authorised activities or hours.

In addition to our own stewards and volunteers, an experienced and uniformed private security firm is employed in a preventative capacity, greeting all that arrive and searching patrons and their bags – a condition of entry - and to provide reassurance. In the event of crime or disorder occurring, including antisocial behaviour, they will take appropriate and proportionate action – which may involve informing the police.

c) Public safety

The physical safety of people attending our event, those performing and of our stallholders, staff and volunteers is paramount and is considered in all we do. All of our main temporary structures – marquee, bar, entrance gazebo etc - are erected, risk assessed and signed off by the professionals who have erected them. They are also covered by their public liability insurance.

Other temporary structures erected by others, are inspected and signed off by our site manager and each stallholder is required to provide details of their public liability insurance and risk assessments.

It is recognised that the main risks to people involved with our event are likely to relate to falls, slips and trips, lifting heavy objects/manual handling, being cut by sharp objects, being exposed to high noise levels or being scalded by hot drinks or food. A

comprehensive risk assessment and fire risk assessment for our event is completed each year and action taken to remove, mitigate or minimise risk.

The venue will comply with all statutory fire safety controls, food safety regulations and take reasonable steps to welcome and facilitate access to those who are disabled.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

We work hard towards preventing public nuisance, including noise nuisance, light pollution and litter and we take reasonable and proportionate steps to prevent disruption to neighbours. We are aware of just one noise complaint in 12 years and understand that this individual is no longer resident in the village. The venue is situated on the southern extremity to the village and the village is largely protected from noise pollution by thick hedging and trees. Additionally, loudspeakers on the outside stage and in the marquee face away from the village. The event is scheduled to end at 2330 hours with the last act finishing their performance in the marquee at 11pm. Sound levels will be monitored throughout the event by the sound engineers and adjusted accordingly.

Those leaving the event will be asked by security, stewards and volunteers to respect villagers and keep voices down and if being collected by taxi, to wait quietly. Stewards and security will patrol the area between the venue and the car park and the area in which people

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normally arrange to be collected by taxis.

The incidence of light pollution has not been identified before and stage lighting generally faces away from the village. The village is in any case largely shielded from the arena by thick hedging and foliage from trees.

Litter monitors will continually patrol the venue and cause litter to be recycled, paying particular attention to glass bottles. All other glass is banned at the event. Groups of people purchasing more than one bottle – for example those attending a hen party – will be offered an empty compartmentalised wine box to put their empty bottles in. At the end of the event a litter patrol will go around the village collecting litter which may have come from our event. We attended a parish meeting on 12th October 2022 where the event was discussed and a number of concerns were expressed about the event, in particular it's nature and size, the suitability of the venue, vehicle movement and car parking and noise from people leaving. A comprehensive response was given in a village newsletter, together with an invitation to hold a public meeting if requested. Up until 10th January 2023, there has been no such request.

e) The protection of children from harm

Children must be protected from moral, psychological and physical harm, including early exposure to strong language, sexual expletives, adult entertainment, alcohol consumption, drug-taking, gambling and violence.

We have chosen not to allow children to attend our comedy event due to the adult nature of the event and the risk of being exposed to any of the above.

At our other events, children must be accompanied by an adult at all times, limiting their potential exposure to any of the above.

Bar staff will be trained in adopting Challenge 25, checking customers' ages and by only accepting the following means of photographic age verification – passport, driving licence or Citizencard.

- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A current Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, **less than 6 months old**, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.

- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member – e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
 - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
 - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
 - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

Original documents must not be sent to licensing authorities. If the document copied is a passport, a copy of the following pages should be provided:

- (i) any page containing the holder's personal details including nationality;
- (ii) any page containing the holder's photograph;
- (iii) any page containing the holder's signature;
- (iv) any page containing the date of expiry; and

(v) any page containing information indicating the holder has permission to enter or remain in

the UK and is permitted to work.

If the document is not a passport, a copy of the whole document should be provided.

Your right to work will be checked as part of your licensing application and this could involve us checking your immigration status with the Home Office. We may otherwise share information with the Home Office. Your licence application will not be determined until you have complied with this guidance.

Home Office online right to work checking service

As an alternative to providing a copy of the documents listed above, applicants may demonstrate their right to work by allowing the licensing authority to carry out a check with the Home Office online right to work checking service.

To demonstrate their right to work via the Home Office online right to work checking service, applicants should include in this application their 9-digit share code (provided to them upon accessing the service at https://www.gov.uk/prove-right-to-work) which, along with the applicant's date of birth (provided within this application), will allow the licensing authority to carry out the check.

In order to establish the applicant's right to work, the check will need to indicate that the applicant is allowed to work in the United Kingdom and is not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

An online check will not be possible in all circumstances because not all applicants will have an immigration status that can be checked online. The Home Office online right to work checking service sets out what information and/or documentation applicants will need in order to access the service. Applicants who are unable to obtain a share code from the service should submit copy documents as set out above.
