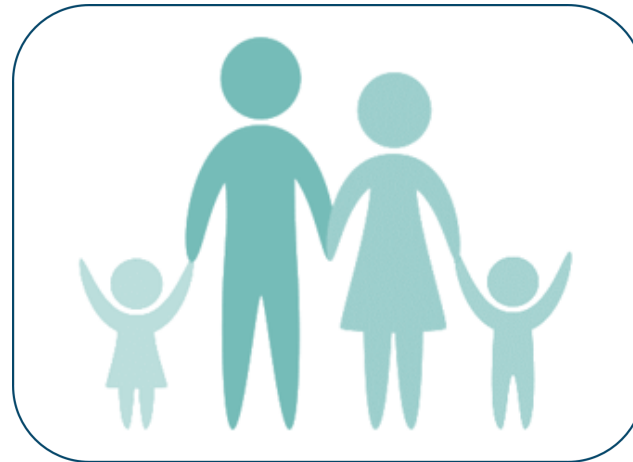

Introduction

This purpose of this report is to provide the Corporate Parenting Board with an overview of performance. These indicators are grouped together under the relevant areas. Work will continue with managers to develop targets.

Overview of Performance

The report assesses the performance of available data during or as at the end of the last month, snapshots of this data are taken. Performance is compared with the previous month and whether there has been an improvement or decline in performance. Where appropriate, a target has been set to ensure high performance and drive improvement and there is RAG rating for these indicators. Targets have been set in line with national and statistical neighbour rates/averages and this information is included in the report where it is available and in discussion with Service Managers.

RAG Rating and Performance Direction

Where a target has been set, indicators are RAG rated in the 'Status' field using the criteria below:

Green Performance is good and in line with or exceeding target: consistent with the National/Statistical Neighbour average.

Amber Performance is below target; inconsistent with National/Statistical Neighbour average; action is in place with likelihood of improvement.

Red Performance is poor; well below expected levels nationally; improvement is required.

Latest performance is compared with the previous month with the icons indicating direction of performance as shown below, based only on whether the figures has increased or decreased since the previous month. Please note, 'Direction of Performance' field is not related to targets and should be used to see where performance is changing and not to judge overall status of the measure; the RAG ratings in the 'Status' field identify where measures are in relation to the target for the latest months performance.

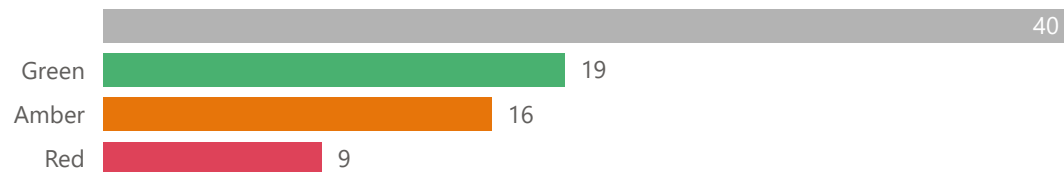

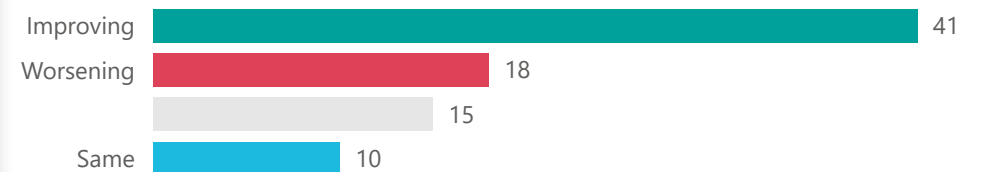

Placement - Fostering Breakdown



Number of CIC



We have **442** children in care (rate of **67** per 10,000), **55** of them are unaccompanied asylum seeking children. In the previous month we had **449**, (**68**) and **54** respectively.

Distance from Home



45 % of our children in care live over 20 miles away from home (excluding our unaccompanied asylum seeking children). Last month it was **44**%.

Placement Stability



Of our children in care who have been in care for 2.5 years (aged 16 or under) **71**% have been in their placement for 2 years or more. Last month it was **71**%.



8 % of our children in care had 3 or more placements in the previous 12 months. Last month it was **9**%.

Health



Of our children who have been in care for at least 12 months (aged 4-16), **63** % have had a strengths & difficulties questionnaire completed. Last month this was **56**%.



Of our new children in care last month, **86**% had their initial health assessment within 20 days. In the month prior to that it was **75**%.

Education



The average attendance for this academic year for our children in care is **87**%, (**87** % up to last month).



100 % of our children in care have had their termly personal education plan completed on time.

Care Leavers



We have **3** care leavers (active, aged 16-25 yrs) in bed and breakfast accommodation. In the previous month we had **3**.



96 % of our care leavers are living in suitable accommodation (active, 19-21 yrs). Last month this was **97**%.



56 % of our care leavers are in employment, education or training (active, 19-21 yrs). Last month this was **51**%.



95 % of our care leavers with an up to date Pathway Plan and end of month (active, 17-25 yrs). Last month this was **90**%.



97 % of our care leavers are in touch with us (active, 19-21 yrs). Last month this was **97**%.

18 children were adopted in the last 12 months.

Profile

Dorset Council have adopted a policy of committing to reduce the number of Children in Care, taking a rights-based approach, and developing services which support children to be able to grow up in a family setting. Keeping a stable child in care population in terms of numbers has helped us to avoid the increase in placement spend that most other local authorities have experienced. The National Transfer Scheme has had immediate effects on Dorset Council with a sharp rise in the number of unaccompanied children in our care and supported by us as care leavers. Our rate of children in care continues to improve and is now netter than Good + statistical neighbours.

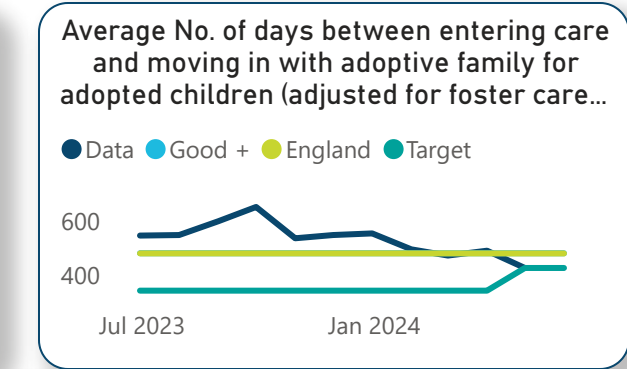
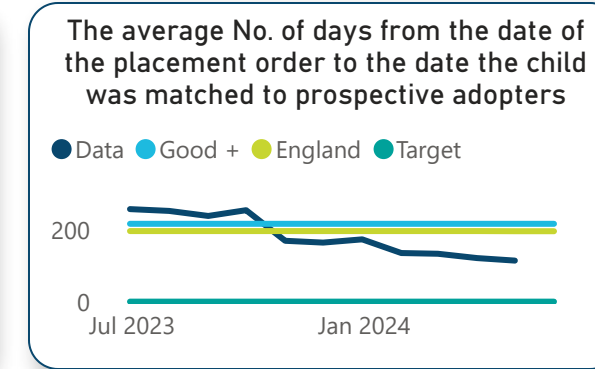
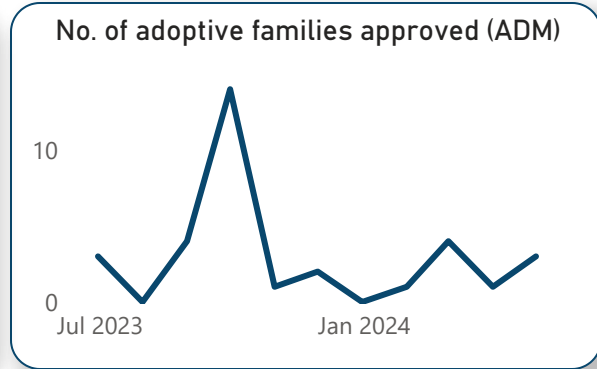
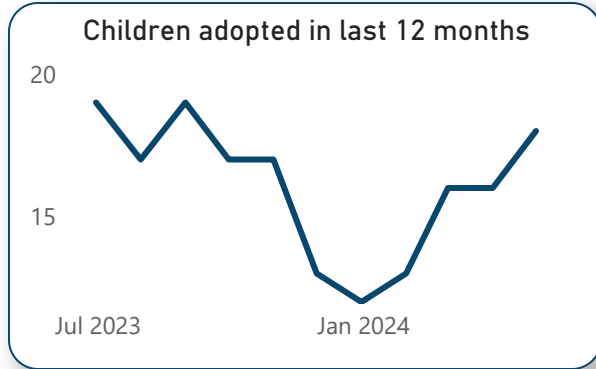

Adoption

It is positive to see the number of children adopted has increased. The partnership working, family finding offer and tracking of children has led to an improvement in timeliness as has the targeted recruitment for adoptive families for those deemed harder to place. This has included sibling groups of 3 and 4, and older children aged up to 9 years of age. We are seeing an increase in adoptive families making enquiries and are targeting recruitment for those children who wait the longest. We are also fast tracking those adoptive families that meet the needs of those harder to place children. Aspire are aware of a national decline in the recruitment and assessment of adoptive families, however were still able to recruit adopters to place 90% of Dorset children with Aspire adopters in 23/24.

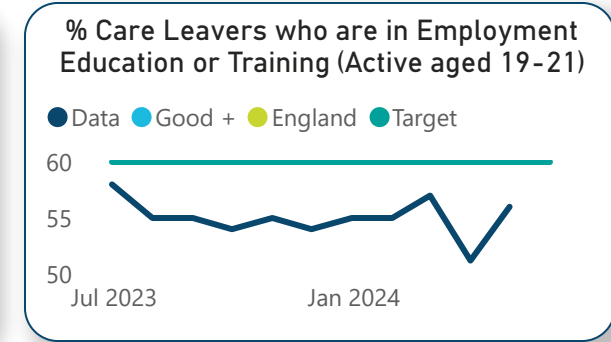
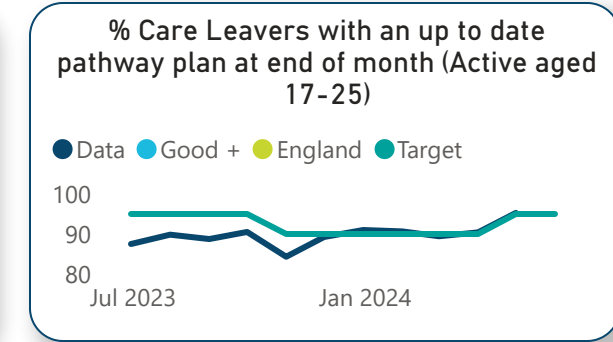
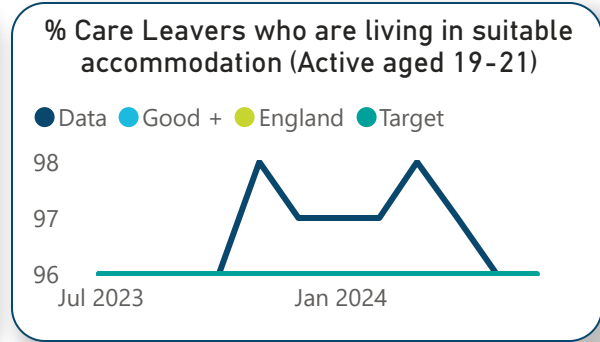
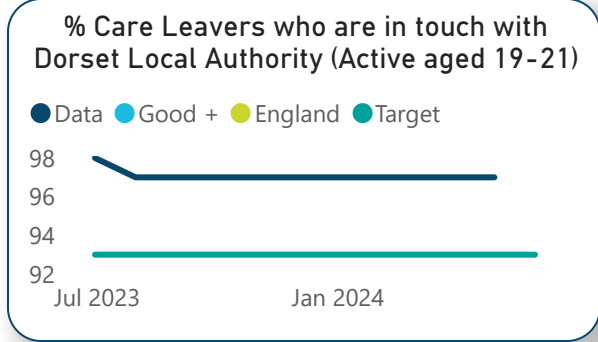

Care Leavers

At the end of April 2024, we had 296 active care leavers (18-25) & were in touch with 96%. There were 10 young people whom we were not successful in making contact with 7 were over the age of 21 and had chosen not to have on-going support from their PA, 1 young person had returned home and 3 were not wanting to engage with their allocated PA. For all the care leavers between 18-21, we continue to try to make contact, check-in and visit and offer the support available.

96% of active care leavers (18-25) had suitable accommodation. 8 care leavers were in unsuitable accommodation. 3 care leavers in custody, 3 in B&B and 2 young people were choosing to stay with friends, they had been offered & declined short term housing by the Council. For the care leavers in unsuitable accommodation (other than custody) there is enhanced PA and management oversight which includes 4 weekly visits (face to face and to see the accommodation), 4 weekly supervision, 4 weekly meetings with housing and weekly updates provided to the head of service and corporate director. 2 of the young people in B&B live outside of the Dorset area and despite us offering rent in advance, rent deposit and to act as a guarantor we have not been able to find any suitable housing through the private rented sector. All the young people have a housing officer and are actively bidding on housing options in the areas of their choice.

At the end of April 2024, the quality of 8 weekly supervision was at 96% and 4 weekly supervision (for those in unsuitable accommodation) at 100%. Our pathway plan completion has also continued to improve, with 94% of pathway plans being reviewed within timescales at the end of April. We know there were 17 outstanding plans and the reasons for delays in completion links to the individual young people's circumstances and agreement to meet with their PA. We continue to ensure that all plans are completed in collaboration with our care leavers, so they are purposeful and clearly reflect and record the views of the young person. The quality of the plans continues to be an area of strength of practice. The number of care leavers engaged with education, employment, or training (EET) was 55% at the end of April 2024. We know that of the 45% NEET (not in education, employment, or training) 30% this is due to illness, 14% due to pregnancy or parenting and 56% due to other circumstances. The Care Leaver EET Tracking group reviews the current action plan, looking at what support care leavers need to begin to re-engage. There is recognition that many care leavers are not ready to access the opportunities we have been developing and that more work is needed to support their emotional well-being and to stabilise their living arrangements before this can happen. We have 7 care leavers on an apprenticeship within Dorset council at the current time with 1 care leaver on a long-term work experience placement with a view to preparing for permanent employment. We have high aspirations for our care leavers, and this continues to be an area of focus for the team.

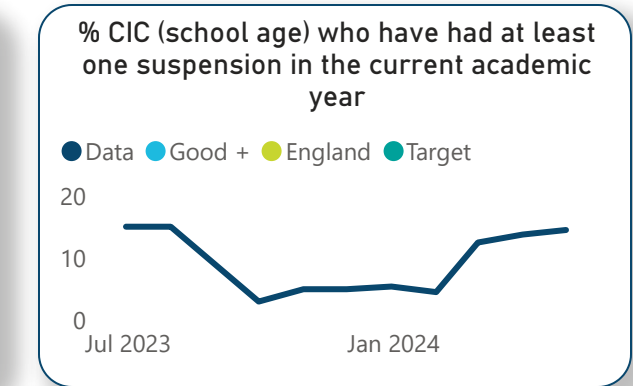
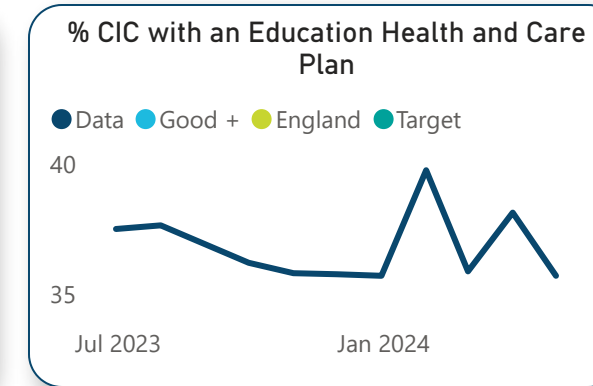
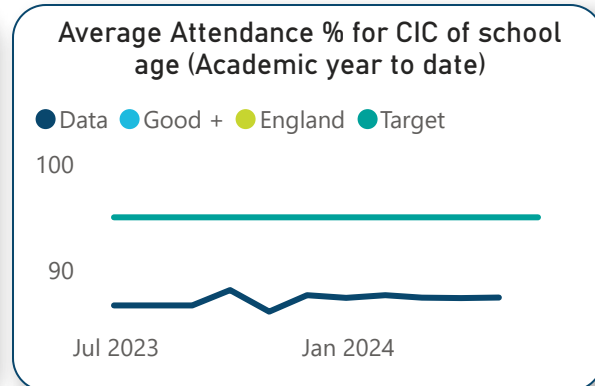
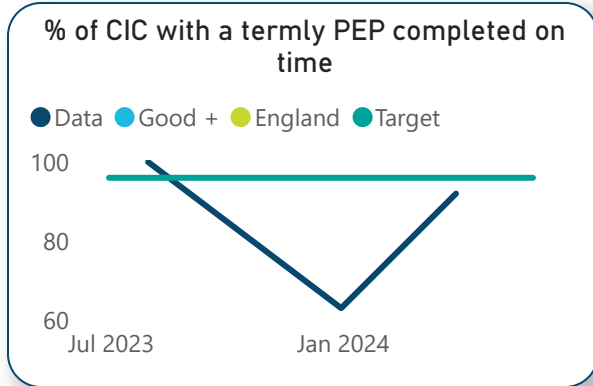

Education

Dorset Virtual School continue to work hard to support our Children in Care and Care Leavers with their education. The Spring Term saw an improvement in the timeliness of PEP completion with 100% of initial PEPs and 92% of all PEPs completed and quality assured within the 20-day timeframes ensuring that all of our children were supported educationally with robust monitoring in place where there are concerns.

PEP quality remained consistently high with 92% of Spring PEPs graded as good or better (double the number of golds from Autumn term 2023). There has been an increase in attendance at PEPs for children, social workers, Personal Advisors and Designated Teachers compared to Autumn 2023.

Attendance for the cohort (discounting those who are CME) stands at 89.97% year to date. Attendance has been affected this academic year by a larger proportion of KS1 children starting on a phased transition. This has improved with moves to full time with an increase seen in reception, year 1 and year 2 since September. There has been a small increase in attendance in year 9 and 10 where previously there was a decline.

Currently, 76.8% of our post-16 young people are in education, employment or training. All children who are NEET are monitored fortnightly on the Inclusion Monitoring Board to ensure that support is in place to re-engage with learning.

The Virtual School has two planned events in place for our children and young people during May half-term, including a digital day in collaboration with Arts University Bournemouth and Bournemouth University focusing on coding, virtual reality and animation as well as an outdoor learning day in collaboration with Weymouth Outdoor Education Centre. Twenty young people are planning to attend these events. The Virtual School is also finalising its plans for the annual Virtual School Awards to be held in July to celebrate our children and young people who have achieved this year, both in education and the wider community.

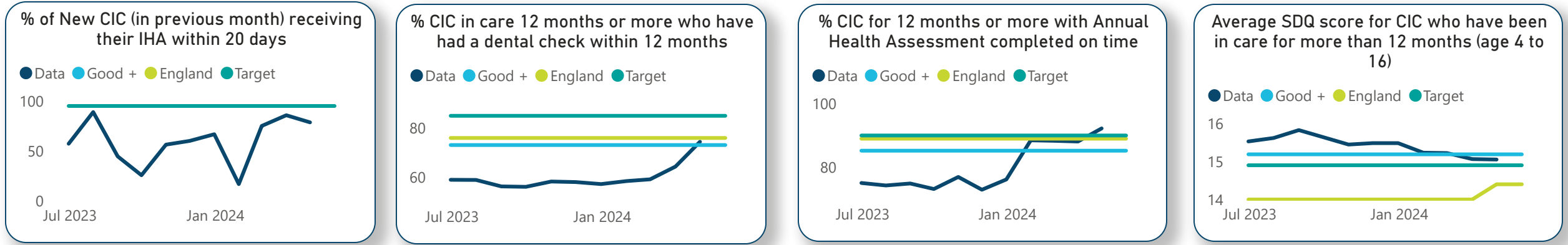

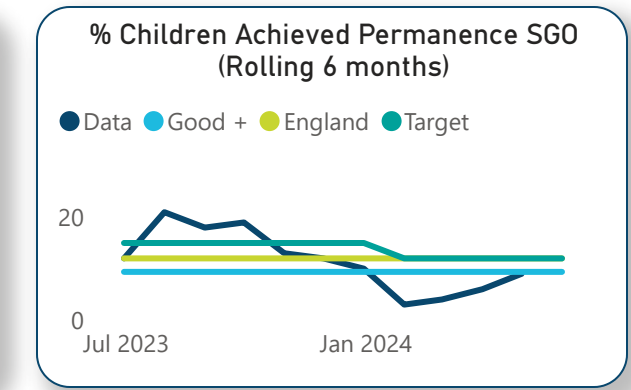
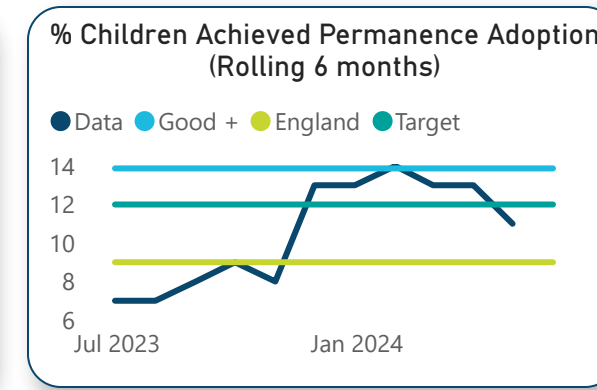
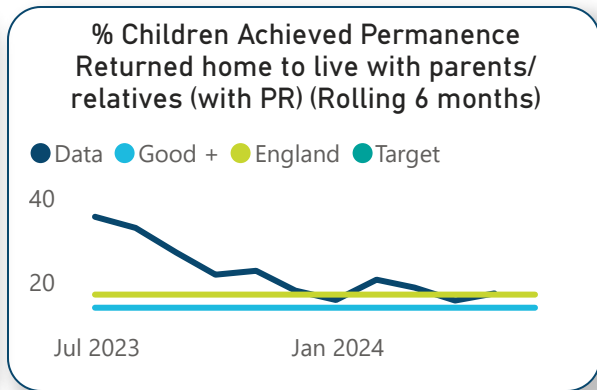
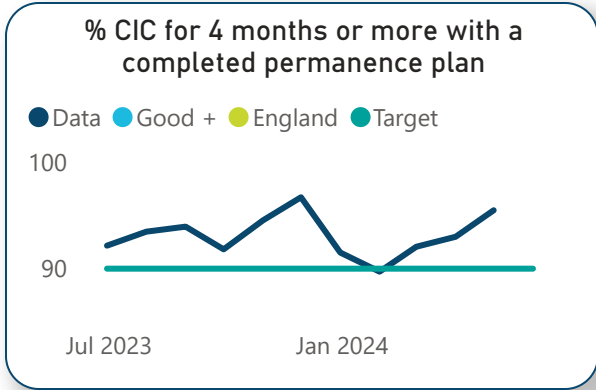
This month we have seen improvement in all areas other than Initial Health Assessments which continues to be volatile with the most significant impact on completion timeliness being associated with children placed outside of Dorset. NHS England is aware of this and has commissioned a dataset to address some of the variations in placements. We continue to work with our foster carers, carers and health colleagues to ensure that timely dental appointments are made for our children. Capacity of NHS dentists is an issue although children in care remain a priority for dentistry in the Southwest. We have strengthened tracking through QA service to be able to identify where nonattendance is due to unavailability of an NHS dentist and take steps to ensure that dental health needs are assessed and treatment made available where required. Completion of SDQ's remains an area of challenge. A task and finish group has been established to understand where the blocks are in enabling timely completion so that the average SDQ score is representative of all our children in care.

Permanence

We have seen a dip in the number of children achieving permanence through adoption, which sometimes can be due to the impact of delays within Court as a result of Courts affording more opportunities to parents for leave to oppose hearings. Even if these are unsuccessful and leave is not granted, this builds in approximately 12 weeks delay. We have 10 children living in their adoptive placement whose hearings for adoption orders are due in May 2024. All other areas are improving and we look forward to welcoming the SG service in house as part of our Kinship Service, where we have a graduated offer of support to meet carers and children's needs.

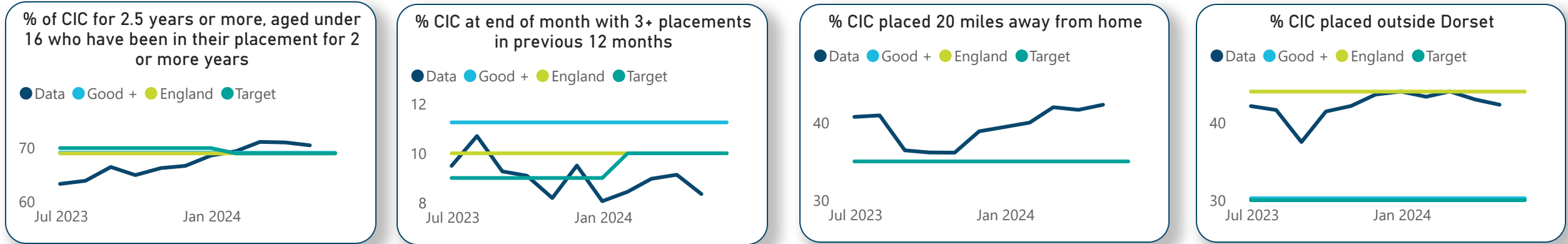

Safety

There was a lot of work done with the fostering service over the last 12 months regarding oversight from the LADO regarding concerns about foster carers. So naturally this has meant there has been a hike in contacts with the fostering service seeking advice and oversight from the LADO service, we would expect this as it indicates that the fostering service is seeking appropriate support from the LADO service. This number includes all enquiries, advice, standards of care and referrals. We can already see this number is balancing back out and we expect that to continue. It is not always accurate picture when recording substantiated LADO for foster carers month to month, as some cases can cut across months. The LADO service continues to work closely with the fostering service.

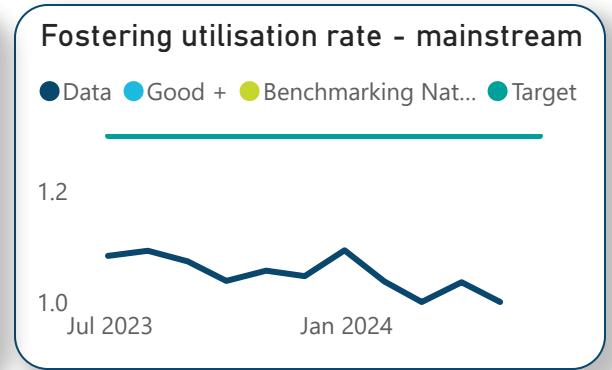
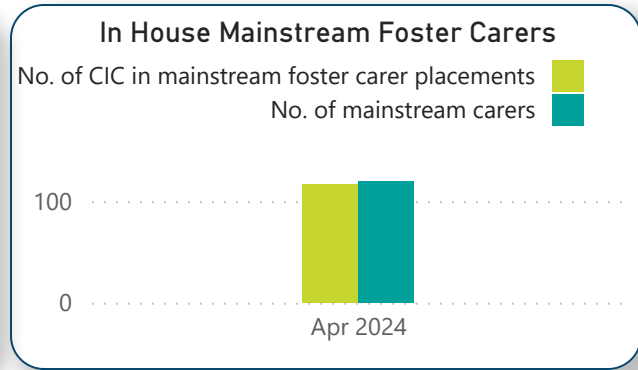
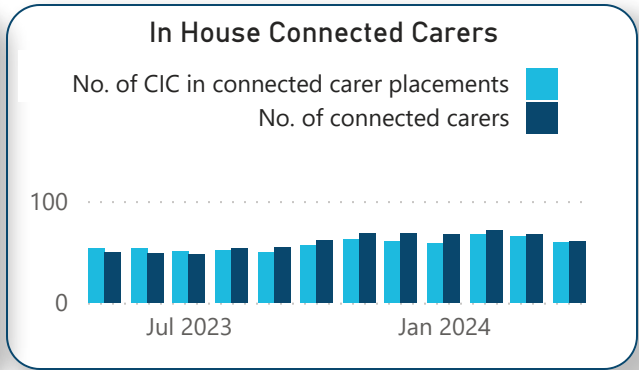
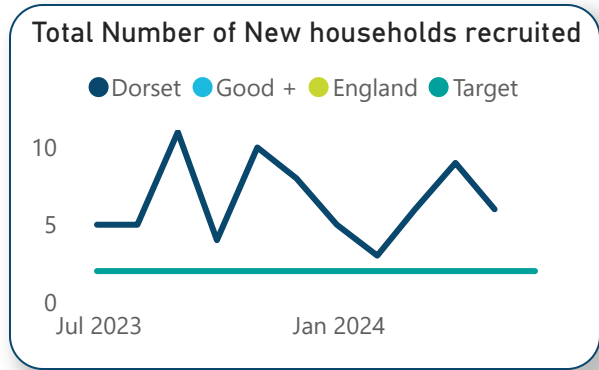

Sufficiency

The decline in the number of foster carers relates to 6 Early Permanence Carers who are progressing to adoption, 1 carer deregistered following allegation, another carer resigned and 2 connected carers resigned as children moved on. The number of mainstream carers has increased. We are noticing some early impact from the Fostering Southwest Hub which has resulted in 9 enquiries with 2 progressing to application form in the last 3 weeks. There are 16 mainstream assessments underway.

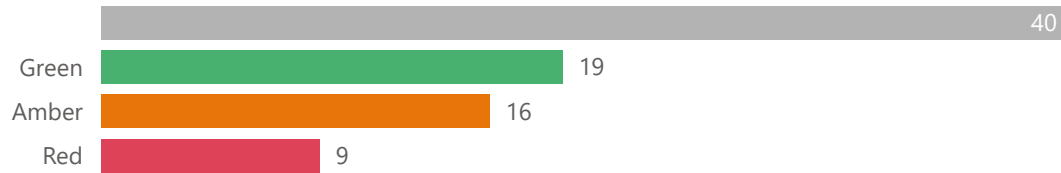

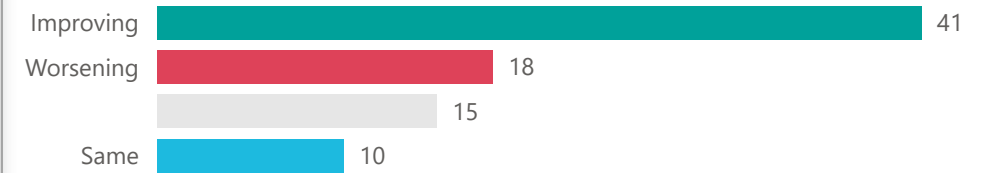
